OUT OF THE PAST PROJECT

The *Tuckerton Beacon* began publication, in 1889, under the name of the *Coastal Pilot*. A year later it became the *Tuckerton Beacon*. Over the years it has been an invaluable source for historical research in our area. Much of what we know about the old days in the Tuckerton area has come from the pages of *The Beacon*.

Unfortunately, the back issues of *The Beacon* prior to 1916 have been lost and are unavailable for research. Thanks to editors, who decided to print excerpts from the older editions in a weekly column called OUT OF THE PAST, we have a portion of the lost information available to us, today. It is a small portion but, non the less, some valuable historical gems have come to light as a result of this column.

One of the research projects that we are working on is the collection of OUT OF THE PAST columns from *The Beacon*. Presently we have scanned and indexed 650 of these columns covering news from 1890 through 1920. They are available, both in print and on computer, for research on Wednesdays at the Giffordtown Schoolhouse Museum.

We are pleased to share some of these columns in this and future newsletters and hope that you find them interesting and enjoyable. The earliest clipping that we found is reproduced on page 2.

OUT OF THE PAST

(This column is reprinted from the Tuckerton Beacon of Thursday afternoon, August 8, 1890.)

TWO MEN KILLED BY LIGHTNING

A very sad accident by lightning occurred at West Creek Ocean Co. on Friday afternoon 1st. during the thunder storm at that place; by which two persons were killed and two injured. While Mr. Nelson Shinn a very active and enterprising business man of that village was receiving fish at his fish packing house adjoining the ice house a bolt of lightning struck the building killing him and Mr. Benjamin Kelley instantly, both of whom were in the packing house, and injuring and stunning Benjamin Fithian who stood in the door, and Thos. Parker who was in the ice house. Three other persons were about and out side of the building but were not seriously injured. The funeral of the deceased men was held on Monday afternoon, and was very largely attended. This sudden and sad bereavement has cast a gloom of sorrow in several homes at West Creek. Mr. Shinn will be especially missed both in the community as an active business man and in the M. E. church of which he was a prominent and consistent member.
